Interview with Bhau Ghadge

Q- When did you join school? I joined school in 2000. I was 19 years old at that time.

Q - Where are you from? From Pabal, Shirur taluka, Pune district. It is around 55 km from Sahyadri School.

Q- How did you end up in Sahyadri? After 10th, I studied in Vigyan Ashram, a learning centre in Pabal village, Pune. Established by a scientist turned educationist, Dr.S.S.Kalbaug in 1983, its motto is learning while doing. They did many hands-on activities during my time there. They even built a tractor from scratch! After studying, I worked for BSNL for 6 months and from there I used to come to school as part of my work with the company. The 'office' asked the BSNL group to help them set up servers and basically work on the IT sector in school and I volunteered to join school and help out.

Q- How is the I.T situation different from when you joined?

A- When I joined, the school was working with bare minimum technology. There were only 2-3 BSNL lines. People used to handwrite everything, there were a few computers but they were very old. In the beginning of 2007 till 2010, they used to put the dongle in a bottle to save from rains and hang it on the roof for the network.



In 2006 the network development started and slowly from there they put servers and eventually had a BSNL tower built in school. This programme or development started originally in Sahyadri and then later got introduced in Rishi Valley and other schools also.

Q- What are your hobbies and interests?

A- Most of my interests are dedicated to coding and social work.

Q- What is your favourite food?

A- I like multiple dishes, one of them being Puranpoli. I am grateful for the food we get in the D.H because it is of good quality and is nutritious. It is also diverse and seasonal in nature.

Q- What kind of songs do you listen to, and who is your favourite?

A- I listen to Bhajans by Suresh Wadkar, an Indian playback singer. He performs in both Hindi and Marathi films. He has worked with famous personalities such as Lata Mangeshkar.

We attended classes, played sports and interacted with them. We also explored the Amte's Animal Art, the Dispensary and the Residential School.

At Anandwan, the disabled people are medically treated, rehabilitated and made financially independent. The highlight for us was learning Indian Sign Language (ISL) and making friends via ISL! We also got to shop for beautiful handicrafts made by the leprosy patients. This was honestly an amazing experience in every aspect (including the delicious food) and something memorable for all of us!

We also had the opportunity to visit One Star School, a private school run by members of SPS. We spent an afternoon there and interacted with the children. Interestingly, we also had a scary experience with a non-venomous snake which we can now laugh about! This experience was one of a kind, we learnt so much about this spectacular NGO and bonded with our batch. We will certainly remember this for ages to come!
