In addition to that, various varieties of finger millet, foxtail millet and barnyard millet are also being grown. There is a dedicated plot for pulses and vegetables too. Although it has rained quite less this year, the impact on growth of crops has not been much.

Interview with the Vice Principal -Rajesh Santhanam

Q: Could you tell us about your childhood, education, and yourself in general?

I am **very passionate about the Sciences**. I have always seen the sciences as integrated and integral to one's education.

What else...? Oh, yes, I have a love for language. My family has lived in so many places, I had the oppotinuity to learn a lot of languages. I know Hindi, Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, and English. I don't think English has to necessarily be the major language, there are so many other beautiful languages and ways to communicate.

CPR Sessions by Dr. Reshma

CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation) is a first aid technique that can be used if someone is not able to breathe properly or if their heart has stopped working

The CPR sessions were organized for senior students by **Dr. Reshma** in order to equip them with skills to respond in emergency situations.

These sessions were planned such that students would receive scientific knowledge along with hands-on practice with the help of mannequins. The students actively participated in the sessions and enjoyed their learning experience.



Sessions by Good Enough

GoodEnough, a collective of trained mental health professionals from Bengaluru conducted wellbeing sessions for students of Grades 10, 11, and 12. Sessions were related to bonding and relationships, responsibility in relationships, sexuality and intimacy, gender identity etc. Students increasingly feel the need to discuss these matters and the school realized that a formal space is required to converse about it. Interactive sessions on the same topics were organized for a group of teachers as well.
